LATEST NEWS

Planting more trees is essential to meeting carbon reduction targets, Welsh Government told

Wales needs to plant 4,000 hectares of new woodland (around 8 million trees) each year to meet the legislated target of an 80% reduction in carbon emissions by 2050, according to a report published today by the UK Climate Change Committee (UKCCC).

The chair of the UKCCC, the Rt. Hon John Gummer, Lord Deben,



commented at the launch that it was disappointing that "Wales had not embraced forestry as it should have in recent years" and that "Wales cannot meet its climate change mitigation obligations until we get on top of the forestry issue, Wales needs a national determination to plant more trees".

Forestry is also at the top of the list identified in the report of 'measures that offer benefits beyond greenhouse gas reduction, such as supporting the seven well-being goals of the Well Being of Future Generations Act.'

A key policy recommendation of the report is, 'The Welsh Government should simplify and streamline the process for supporting tree planting, in order to reduce the barriers to action.'

I attended the launch of the report in Cardiff and commented that: 'It is encouraging to see this recognition of the vital role of forestry. Growing trees for timber is a significant carbon sink and using that timber in construction locks the carbon up in buildings for many decades. Forestry is a vibrant part of our rural economy, and the industry is ready to invest and plant trees as soon as the blocks to planting are addressed.' Read more

Call for more planting to save forestry jobs was the title of a Western mail article in December.

"WALES has lost 40 million trees in the last 15 years and action needs to be taken to protect thousands of forestry jobs, the Welsh Government has been warned.

Businesses are warning of sawmill closures and a rural employment crisis unless swift action is taken." The report was put together by David Lee, Confor's publicity guru, and Martin Shipton Chief reporter for the Western mail.

The Branching out Report, by the Climate Change, Environment & Rural Affairs committee, still making news.

The Welsh Assembly debated the report in the Senedd in December with Committee chair Mike Hedges reporting that all the stakeholders consulted for this report had called for significantly increased planting rates. There was no shortage of finance or ideas, he said: forestry is profitable, and could have a significant role to play in regenerating former industrial areas, enabling farmers to access payments for ecosystem services, and building on what is already a significant part of the economy, already generating 10,000 jobs and half a billion pounds GVA.

Many other AM's queued up to commend the report and call on WG to act on it.

In reply the Environment Minister Hannah Blythyn told the Welsh Assembly that improving and expanding the woodland of Wales will be one of her top priorities.

The Minister said that she would explore all avenues for speeding up woodland creation, including removing barriers to planting, collaboration between stakeholders, areas of presumption in favour of woodland creation and forestry as a carbon sink.



One of the recommendations in the report was that "The Welsh Government must, as a matter of urgency, refresh its woodland strategy with the aim of significantly increasing planting rates. The refreshed strategy must include long term targets for woodland cover and must incorporate commercial forestry".

The minister has asked the Woodland Strategy Advisory Panel to look at this and come up with a light touch review of the Woodlands for

Wales strategy and we are working on that now.

Some of the Confor Wales Committee met with Environment Minister Hannah Blythyn in



November and we are planning a series of site visits for the minister throughout 2018 to show the minister the sector.

Rural Broadband

In response to complaints from Confor members I contacted Plaid Cymru Shadow Cabinet

Secretary for Energy, Climate Change and Rural Affairs Simon Thomas and asked him to help.

In a debate in the Senedd in November he has called on the Welsh Government to stop the "superfast" broadband rip off and ensure that people in all parts of Wales have



adequate access to the internet." Mr Thomas cited Confor member's complaints in his questioning of WG saying: "Adequate access to broadband is no longer considered a luxury for businesses and households across Wales, but rather an essential service for commerce, healthy living, to reduce environmental impact, social interaction and education." He added, "The UK Government has begun planning ahead of 5G technology, whilst the Welsh Government is still grappling with 4G. I want to see the Welsh Government upgrade its 4G infrastructure to give people dependable access to the internet wherever in Wales they are."

A New Woodland & Forestry Management Plan template is under

development by the Confor Wales Committee and NRW. The idea is to have a long term management plan (up to 10 years) for the private sector. By submitting information in advance with sufficient detail, NRW could give approvals for a longer time period than the current 2 years allowed under the present felling licence process.

The draft template is undergoing trials now and hopefully will be ready to launch soon.

Funding will also be available to help with the production of these long term plans and this will be from the Farming Connect programme.

The Farming Connect programme has kindly offered to help run a few workshops to publicise the new template early in 2018. These workshops will also provide information on the funding that is available from the farming connect programme for writing management plans and how to access that funding.

Area Statements

The process of NRW gathering information and data to inform

the area statements process is ongoing, they have decided that there will be 7 areas for the process (defined in the map), and including 1 for the whole of the marine NRW will environment. shortly be conducting a survey to ask if you wish to be involved and we will send out the link when it arrives.



Woodland Carbon Code Update – November 2017

There's now 150 projects which have passed the first milestone of validation. Of these, 5 have now past the second milestone - the year 5 verification check - and now have verified carbon units available, and there are more following in their steps over the next few months. PLANT HEALTH

All quiet on P ramorum until the surveillance flights restart.

However there is something called the Plant Passport on the horizon, an EU piece of legislation that at present will require movement of timber, bark and other biological material within the UK to be passported. There is a meeting planned in February which we are attending to make sure our sector is not disadvantaged by this.

CONSULTATIONS

Consultation on the NRW Charging Scheme for 2018-19

NRW are required by Government to recover the costs of delivering regulatory services from those being regulated, rather than being funded by general taxation and this accounts for approximately 20% of Natural Resources Wales total funding. NRW Fees and Charges Scheme is reviewed regularly to ensure that costs are covered and technical requirements are being met. As a result of the most recent review NRW are proposing to maintain the current levels of their baseline charges but are proposing a new upper tier for hydropower abstractions and an increase to their hourly rate for pollution incident response cost recovery.

NRW are seeking your views and opinions on proposals for fees and charges for 2018/19. This 12 week consultation will close on 16th January 2018 and the results will be used to inform the final scheme, which will be introduced from 1st April 2018. UK Committee on Climate Change Call for Evidence – Bioenergy Review

The UKCCC is planning to update its work on bioenergy, culminating in a new Bioenergy Review to be published in Autumn 2018. This will consider the latest evidence to provide an updated view on the role of bioenergy in meeting both the United Kingdom and Wales's climate change targets. The review will provide an updated view on the role of bioenergy in decarbonising the UK economy through to 2050. Key themes to be explored include sustainability and certification, GHG emissions accounting, developing sustainable supply, non-energy uses of bioenergy resources, and transitions to future best- uses of bioenergy resources. FUNDING AND FINANCE

The Timber Business Investment provides scheme funding for capital investments that add value to forests by enabling woodland management, timber harvesting and/or timber processing. The scheme is open to private forest owners, local authorities, SME's and community organisations or forestry contractors. Investments supported by the scheme must be related to improvements in value in forests, for example by enabling woodland management activities, timber harvesting and/or in-forest or small-scale timber processing.

EOI window opens on 1st February 2018 and closes on 18th April. Examples of eligible activities supported include:

•small to medium scale forest-based investments that will enhance forestry potential or that relate to the harvesting, processing and adding value to forest products, particularly environmentally friendly technology, including cable- cranes, skidders and other equipment suitable for small and/or inaccessible woodlands

•investments in development and rationalisation of the marketing and processing of wood and wood products

•investments related to the use of wood as a raw material and energy source prior to industrial processing

•investment may include small forest nursery related developments that are specifically related to one or more forest holdings

•investments must be related to the improvement of the economic value of specific forests.

Glastir Woodland Creation
