Brexit and our Land

Confor submitted evidence to the important Welsh Government consultation *Brexit and Our Land*, which will provide the policy and funding framework for farming and forestry after Brexit.



Welsh Government held workshops around the country which a number of Confor members attended. We are very grateful to all our members who responded to the consultation to help provide a strong voice for forestry.

The key points in Confor's response include:

- The Welsh Woodland Creation strategy requires urgency and ambition across Welsh Government.
- Planting must favour forests producing highvalue timber under the UK Forestry

Standard, which deliver the greatest range of benefits.

- We warmly welcome the hints about a stepchange in funding for forestry as early as next year.
 - Some funding should be announced now, recognising the time involved in preparing forestry plans.
 - The 'windows' system should be replaced with a first-come-first-served system of applications.
- NRW must be provided with sufficient staff resources to handle increased applications. This should include:
 - a dedicated unit to handle large woodland creation applications;
 - a lead individual tasked with improving the woodland creation process.
- We would welcome a carbon funding scheme under the public goods package. Funding to bring unmanaged woodland into management is also important.
- Capital grants should also be available for planting timber crops under the economic resilience package.
- A target of at least 4000 hectares/year, as per the Committee on Climate Change recommendations, must be maintained and ideally restored to the 2010 target of 5000ha. The estimated area of conifer woodland in Wales has decreased by 18,000ha since 2001.1 At least 60,000ha new planting is required merely to sustain wood supply at current levels and prevent job-losses in the processing sector; an additional 11,000ha would be required to supply a Welsh CLT plant exclusive of any future growth in the use of Welsh timber in existing sectors, such as timber frame housing, fencing, pallets, packaging, paper, biomass, or exports to England;
- We welcome the proposal for a scheme of outcome-based payments for public goods in which 'there is no reason why a farmer or forester cannot produce public goods and food and timber.'
- We welcome the proposal for multi-year agreements to deliver meaningful public goods over years or decades.
- The scheme should commit to a principle of a level playing field for different land uses in eligibility for all relevant funding.
- We would welcome the opportunity as a sector to take part in public goods scheme trials.

What next? Welsh Government have received several thousand responses to the consultation. Having read these, they will publish a White Paper with proposals, which will be an opportunity for further comment.

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A low carbon pathway for Wales

Wales is required by law to reduce its carbon emissions by at least 80% by 2050. Confor submitted evidence on proposals for reduction by at least 45% between now and 2030.

Key points in Confor's response included:

• A need for urgency and ambition in tree planting given the ongoing failure to meet targets (below)

- Favour forests that produce high-value timber
- Capital grants for planting to encourage farmers to diversify into forestry
- A high-level individual tasked with improving the approvals process
- Test other land-use support for carbon costs caused by creating a competitive disadvantage for forestry
- Collaborate with private-sector investors to achieve cost-effective planting
- Ensure architects do not over-specify, excluding Welsh timber from use in construction
- Improve forecasts of Welsh timber availability so that the timber resource can be used to maximise carbon benefit
- Develop a smart wood-fuel incentive to decarbonise rural heating and bring woodland into management without skewing the softwood market

What next? The consultation responses will help to develop Wales' first Low Carbon Delivery Plan, due in March 2019.

Enabling Natural Resources and Well-Being in Wales 2019-2023: Call for Grant Proposals

The Welsh Government is setting in place revised grant arrangements to support implementation of the Natural Resources Policy, making clearer links between Wales' natural resources and well-being.

The scheme has 3 themes of action under which grant applications can be made:

- Developing, regenerating and broadening access to sustainable green infrastructure
- Improving the quality of the urban and rural built environment
- Developing resilient ecological networks and nature-based solutions

The grant is open to a wide range of organisations working in a collaborative way to deliver activity and will provide both revenue and capital funding.
