Confor election manifesto

Confor has set out its aims for the next Government in a simple, three-point plan to plant more trees, manage our woods better and use more home-grown wood.

Chief Executive Stuart Goodall said the parties' manifestos showed forestry and wood had moved up the political agenda significantly, but that there was a lot of work to do to make commitments happen.

Goodall welcomed Mr some commitments by the main parties to new planting. The Conservatives say they will 'triple UK tree-planting rates to 30,000 hectares every year'.

The Lib Dems have pledged to "plant 60" million trees every year, increasing UK forest cover by 1 million hectares by 2045.

promises "an ambitious programme of tree planting, with both forestry and native woodland species".

Plaid Cymru's manifesto closely mirrors Confor's planting proposals for Wales.

However, Mr Goodall added, the manifesto is not just about new planting. He said: 'It also calls for our existing woodlands to be better-managed, to unlock their potential to deliver a wide range of benefits.

'Managing our existing woods better can deliver speedier benefits in terms of mitigating climate change effectively through faster growth and wood products, but also delivering wider benefits in terms biodiversity, of rural employment, recreation and much more.

'Finally, using more home-grown wood will displace energy-intensive (and therefore carbon-intensive), materials construction and around our homes.'

The manifesto also stresses that modern, mixed-species forestry can deliver on a whole range of economic, environmental and social agendas.

A new hope for grey squirrel management

Sauirrel Accord partnership is fundraising for research into an oral contraceptive to tackle the negative impacts the invasive non-native grey squirrel causes to native red squirrels and broadleaf trees. As thousands of trees are planted during National Tree Week 2019, we celebrate our success towards developing a new method to help protect those trees from grey squirrel bark stripping damage.

Research into the immunocontraceptive is being carried out by the well-respected Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA). Researchers are working to turn a proven injectable formulation into an oral contraceptive that will be delivered to grey squirrels via food in a species-specific feeding hopper.

Highlights at the end of the second year of research:

Significant progress in understanding how contraceptives could be effectively deployed. Different densities of hoppers were tested to monitor food (without immunocontraceptive) uptake by grey squirrel populations in woods of 6-18 hectares. Results suggest that only four days is required in summer to ensure the majority of grey squirrels access and consume the food.

Volunteer-led trial in a larger wood (30 hectares). In collaboration with the British Association for Shooting and Conservation (BASC) and the Deer Initiative. Early analysis shows results are very similar to smaller woods. It also demonstrated the feasibility of volunteer groups successfully deploying hoppers in the field.

Physiological indicators of reproduction in grey squirrels were identified. These indicators will be able to show the effectiveness of the contraceptive vaccine.

Optimising the formulation, dose and frequency of dosing required to turn the injectable vaccine into an effective oral contraceptive. These trials are carried out in collaboration with international groups of researchers at the forefront of research and development in this area.

Based on camera traps, a method was developed to estimate the number of grey squirrels in a woodland. This provides end-users with a tool to assess the effort required to significantly reduce or eradicate grey squirrels from a given area.

A mathematical model to quantify the effects of fertility control on grey squirrel numbers. Modelling suggests fertility control applied in conjunction with culling is most effective at eradicating or significantly reducing densities of grey squirrels to numbers low enough to mitigate most of the economic and environmental problems they cause.

The oral contraceptive research offers a real opportunity to halt grey squirrel population growth and reduce their numbers and negative impacts. UKSA still needs to raise £250,000 to complete the project. Timber Lorry Overloading

A number of processing members have highlighted to me that they have received additional letters from NRW talking about vehicle loading. I am seeking clarity from NRW on their policy as there is a lack of detail about what they are defining as an overloaded vehicle and what constitutes grounds for breach of contract.

HSE/FISA & NRW

FISA guidance for Forest Welfare Units has now been published and in addition NRW have been advising contract holders that they required compliance with their internal documentation in early December, FISA 806 Welfare Guide available from the website.

There is a FISA/NRW workshop being held on 11 December at the Royal Welsh Showground at 4pm.

Forest Industry Group

There has been an appointment within the Welsh Government forest policy team for a role as the Head of Forest Reform. Jon Travis began in mid-November and has been exploring the industry working group as a positive way for Welsh Government to engage. This together with the positive support from NRW staff means that a revised version of the Forest Industry Business Group could look to meet in the New Year.

Timber marketing

NRW have proposed a date of 18 February for the next Timber Liaison Day. It is proposed that as Confor and processing members meet on 30 January to put together a series of written questions and agenda for this meeting.

I am in contact with a number of members about this but once again I would urge anyone who is having problems to get in touch. This is a good opportunity for us to engage and challenge the problems and mistakes being made.

Forestry Training

I am continuing to develop a series of events for 2020 on knowledge transfer in the forestry sector. We have a number of good ideas and workshop requirements but as always if there is something that you feel requires addressing please get in contact.

Welsh Government & National **Forest**

On 30 November Welsh Saturday Government launched Prosperity for all: A Climate conscious Wales. The launch of this signifies further that large elements of the Welsh Government policy on climate change, decarbonisation, flood mitigation, air and water quality improvements can be delivered through tree planting and the establishment of new forests. Confor will continue to drive the message that to deliver these benefits, we need a healthy timber and forestry industry, skilled up and resourced appropriately to meet the demands of this changing world. The supply and planting will not be switched on overnight but sustained support and action can ensure that these Welsh Government targets can be met going forward.


