

A fund for our future?

Confor CEO Stuart Goodall has been exploring the potential for an Industry Fund. Many of our counterparts around the world have introduced a fund or levy to deliver priorities of shared value to the whole sector.

Confor is preparing a prospectus setting out in detail how the fund would work, what activities it could support, what benefits it should deliver, and provide answers to questions that have been raised. This will become the basis for formal consultation with the industry.

Stuart held a discussion about the fund at the Confor Woodland Show, the first in a series of events around the UK. Confor members are encouraged to attend and provide input to ensure the prospectus is as comprehensive as possible.

More detail on the fund, and a Q&A with the head of the New Zealand levy system, are in the October issue of *Forestry and Timber News*.

At the Confor AGM on 27 August 2019. John Kissock OBE was appointed Chair of Confor in succession to Athole McKillop. John is well known in the UK forestry and forest products sector, having been joint Managing Director of James Jones & Sons Ltd until his retirement in 2007. Forestry Statistics

The 2019 edition of Forest Research's Forestry Statistics and Forestry Facts and Figures was released on 26 September. This contains figures on woodland creation, timber use and trade, carbon and wildlife, employment and recreation, and international forestry. The statistics

are available on the <u>Forest Research</u> Website.

Forestry Statistics is currently being reviewed to provide greater value to users. If you would like to contribute your views to the review, please complete the on-line survey.

Forestry Skills Forum

The England and Wales Forestry Skills Forum includes Confor, ICF, RFS, Forest Education Network, Sylva, and other organisations covering everything from primary schools to further education. It is working towards a skills action plan for each area.

Confor collaborates with others to work on industry skills including wood in construction, forest machine operator training, CPD, wood and tree health, and nurseries.

Plant health

Phytophthora ramorum

The annual programme of helicopter flights to assess the spread of *P. ramorum* has been completed having been held up by the *Ips* outbreak. Early indications from some parts of the country suggest that the situation may be similar to last year, with infection generally in proximity to previously confirmed infections. Suspect trees seen from the air are inspected and tests carried out to confirm the presence of the disease.

Dendroctonus micans

Confor will be writing to all members to ask for a contribution towards the breeding programme for *Rhizophagus grandis* the predatory beetle of the larvae of *D. micans*. *D. micans* continues to be a threat and parts of Northern France have been decimated by the beetle.

Oak Lace Bug

Defra published emergency regulations proposing to ban the import of all roundwood of oak and Sweet chestnut due to Oak Lace Bug. Our hardwood members highlighted significant economic impact this would have on them. Confor helped coordinate a meeting with the mills and Forestry Commission, and submitted a response to the consultation and critical analysis to the Pest Risk Assessment. The additional information supplied by the mills and Confor significantly undermines the conclusions drawn by Defra's Plant Health Team.

Plant passporting

Discussions are continuing on the introduction of practical measures for Plant Passporting, which comes into force on 14 December 2019. Our focus remains on ensuring a reasonable, practical, proportionate and risk-based approach by plant health authorities in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland.

Plant passports will be required for the movement of:

- roundwood of all conifers, Sweet Chestnut and Plane
- bulk bark, brash and wood chipped on site
- Christmas trees over 3 metres and decorative foliage from such trees.

Sawdust, wood chips containing bark and slabwood with bark from sawmills to other sites are currently considered to be a lower risk and are not expected to require Plant Passports.

Plant passporting is already operating in the UK nursery/ plant trade, focussed on traceability of wood with bark.

The Plant Passporting Technical Working Sub-Group continues to meet regularly and is focussing on practical implementation and operation of the new measures. Plant Passports can be incorporated within delivery advice notes, avoiding the need for a separate

document. Electronic copies must be retained for at least 3 years. Companies responsible for issuing Plant Passports will have to be registered with and authorised by Forestry Commission England, (acting on behalf of the public forestry bodies in Scotland and Wales). Details of the registration, authorisation and inspection process and associated fees are awaited.

Plant Health Assurance Scheme

In response to the critical threat posed by *Xylella Fastidiosa* and other plant health risks, Confor and the HTA are developing the PHAS. It is being designed to mitigate, protect, and potentially compensate horticulture businesses from the risks posed by a serious plant health incident.

WALES NEWS

Glastir

In April 2019 Glastir Woodland Creation opened for 5 weeks instead of the normal 8, with £1m funding for roughly 230 hectares of planting.

At close of the expressions of interest (EOI), there were applications for 2600 hectares totalling about £11.8m. This exceeds the Welsh Government target of 2000 hectares by 30%.

The obstacle to tree planting is not land availability or farmer opposition. Four months after EOIs closed, Rural Payment Wales have not responded to any of the plans. There is now not enough time to plan these schemes for 2019/2020 planting season and therefore a strong possibility that, in the face of climate emergency, no trees will be planted in Wales this winter.

I have written to the head of forest policy and deputy director of land and environment in Welsh Government to detail the above points. I was originally advised that EOI responses would be complete by end of August 2019. As this is not the case, I have again written asking why this is and requesting the situation be expedited.

I am working with CLA and Woodland Trust to develop a joint press release regarding this failure.

Natural Resources Wales

Timber Lorry Overloading

 NRW discontinued the self-policing system on 1 August 2019 and introduced a 44 tonne limit with no industry consultation or accounting for equipment accuracy

Confor immediately raised its concerns about these unconsulted changes. NRW have advised they have had issues with operators consistently in the 44-45t zone with instances of illegal loading over 45t.

NRW are gathering statistics on frequency and seriousness of overloading. In July, of 1680 dispatches, 465 were over 44t and 37 over 45t. 29 of these incidences were between two operators. In August there was a marked improvement in performance with 12 loads over 45t and 159 over 44t.

I have requested that NRW approach the small number of persistent offenders first. NRW is continuing to monitor figures and communicate directly with offending hauliers. I am not aware of any contracts being stopped under 45t.

Operators are requested to contact me if this situation changes.

Sale frequency & Timber marketing program review

- In August, NRW changed from 6 timber sales p.a. to 5
- A review of the sale program is in progress to deliver the 700,000m³ committed this financial year
- An internal review is underway on direct production v. standing sale.

NRW are now drafting their timber sales plan to 2022 and I have requested that Confor and the industry are consulted. There is concern about the change from volume to area contracts. I have been advised that the program to update the NRW forest plans does not involve a mensuration update.

If you encounter stand information, volume and breakout types at odds to the physical crop, please let me know and Confor will report any disparity.

I will be proposing solutions to address the poor-quality field data at my next meeting with Clare Pillman, head of NRW.

Mineral extraction claims

- Multiple Confor members and NRW struck with claims over use and value of minerals rights
- Confor requested to facilitate a meeting between members and NRW to discuss.

I have scheduled a meeting with NRW and two Confor members to review both parties' positions.

Ash dieback

- Widespread Ash dieback is creating a land management and safety issue
- No funding or support for disease management
- Local Government, NRW, Welsh Government and private landowners are not co-ordinating action.

Since the first meeting of the Welsh Strategic Ash Dieback Group nothing has been issued from Welsh Government or NRW on a course of action to deal with this problem. Several landowners and Confor agents have approached requesting advice and guidance.

Confor has written to the Welsh Local Government Association to propose ways for Public Service Boards, landowners and highway authorities to reduce expensive road closures for dealing with diseased trees.

Recent advice from Defra indicated that funding had been made available to Welsh Government for removal of infected trees. We are investigating this claim.

Consultations

Sustainable Farming & Our Land

- Welsh Government has set out proposals for the replacement of Common Agricultural Policy funding, in the document Sustainable Farming and our Land.
- Confor is working on a response by 30 October.

The consultation proposes payments for the creation and maintenance of wildlife habitat, business investment including capital grants and training, increased advice schemes, investment in the Welsh

supply chain, and a clear and integrated regulatory framework.

The consultation is couched strongly in the language of 'farming' although the consultation document states that 'the majority of the discussion equally applies to farmers and other land managers'. There are also hints that the word 'food' refers to 'produce' in a wider sense, including timber.

However, this is not clear, and Confor will be seeking reassurance as to which parts of the proposals include or exclude forestry.

Confor will be meeting with Woodland Trust, RFS and ICF to discuss our responses, and draft a strong and cohesive joint response.

National Development Framework (NDF)

- This consultation considers complete land-use framework and integrated decision-making process.
- It does not appear to recognise that farming and forestry underpin Welsh landscapes and habitats.

Confor is reviewing this document which sets out future policy for investment in land use, and commentary on the proposed National Forest.

Further detail will be made available to members once the draft response to consultation document has been developed.

Welsh Government

Woodland for Wales Indicators

- Welsh Government are updating the Woodland for Wales Indicators and propose to exclude the industry data.
- Confor is strongly resisting this.

Industry data is of low quality and significantly out of date, and I have been working with Welsh Government to find solutions to update it. Unfortunately, the time available is too short for the November publication. Confor will keep pressure on Welsh Government to procure the information and include Forestry Sector indicators in 2020.

National Forest

- First Minister keen to deliver National Forest manifesto commitment.
- Woodland Strategic Advisory Panel tasked with guiding proposals.
- Project currently in discover phase till March 2020.

Confor sits on the WSAP task and finish group which initially struggled with the vagueness of the brief for a national forest. The concept has now been clarified as a Wales-wide national forest program.

Confor believes this must be in additional, and not a distraction from the need for a successful private sector woodland creation program.

The group will report to WSAP on 14 October.

Forest Industry Strategy

A Forest Industry Strategy is required to draw together actions required across the supply chain to increase a sustainable supply of structural grade timber. Confor is currently reviewing Scottish and Irish documents to produce a draft outline.

Health and Safety

Forest Welfare Units

- HSE in Wales are prioritising provision of welfare units on active forest sites.
- Three versions of grab tanks have been provided for HSE scrutiny and not met required standard.
- FISA position statement due imminently.

Members have challenged FISA to support their interests with HSE. FISA have led discussion with welfare unit providers and HSE to identify solutions. NRW have just drafted their own policy and Confor have requested they engage with industry to ensure that private and public standards are aligned.

ENGLAND NEWS

Development of Environmental Land Management, the new English rural payments scheme

Confor is closely involved in the development of the Defra's new Environmental Land Management Scheme (ELM).

This flagship programme aims to ensure that rural payments reward land managers for 'public goods' not currently rewarded by the marketplace, such as carbon, biodiversity and access.

Defra developed a timetable for transition away from CAP-style funding, with an annual decrease in hectarage payments while the ELM programme introduced. The challenge is to design schemes which deliver robust public goods sufficiently cost-effectively, while providing land managers with financial rewards through sufficiently а straightforward process to attract them to enter the scheme.

Confor is closely involved in the development of the scheme through the 'tests & trials' programme.

Short 'tests' and more comprehensive 'trials' are underway. An assessment of the existing agri-environment scheme provides a starting evidence base; and tests & trials aim to develop new elements. The question is not whether interventions bring about environmental outcomes: the actions are based on existing evidence. Rather, the test is whether mechanisms such as land management plans, advice and guidance, payments, spatial prioritisation, collaboration, and other innovative solutions, are effective in changing landowner behaviour.

Initial results from two pioneer projects, in Cumbria and North Devon, revealed low awareness of ELM or natural capital, a wariness of collaboration, and strong support for a two-tier system with a payment universal for widespread environmental practices and payments for specific interventions. In the Devon trial, which aims to create synergies between environmental and business opportunities, only 15% of farmers had a written business plan.

18 further tests & trials have gone out to contract and should begin imminently with a further 30 to be issued shortly. Common themes are land management natural innovative plans, capital, standards, approaches, and assessment techniques. They include a private sector/ Forestry Commission project exploring what needs to be included in a land management plan from aspect and forestry how information will be gathered. Lockhart Garratt, Pryor and Rickett and Andy Poore are taking this trial forward.

Following the tests & trials period, a National Pilot based on а land management plan is scheduled to be launched in 2021, with the full scheme launching in 2024. Tests & trials will continue to develop new refinements and opportunities and there will be an annual call for proposals. Confor urged that the findings of tests and trials be made public so that stakeholders and land managers can engage with projects relevant to their local area or sector.

ELM will not be the only mechanism by which Defra will aim to hit tree planting targets: it is recognised these need to be addressed before 2024. mechanisms and budgets are being considered, alongside a range of other questions about how ELMS will integrate other fundina streams government priorities.

Agricultural Bill

Confor and our members have put a great deal of work into the development of the government's flagship Agriculture Bill, which provides a mechanism for rural support after Brexit and the delivery of the priorities of the 25 Year Environment Plan.

Confor welcomed the proposal to put the 25 year plan, which includes a target equating to 7,500 hectares of woodland creation in England each year, on a statutory footing.

The bill was deemed to have fallen with the prorogation of parliament on 9 September; but the landmark decision of the Supreme Court on 24 September means that it is still alive.

The bill faces continued uncertainty in the case of the government falling or a general election being called.

Labour Party Conference



Confor took the issue of tree planting to tackle the climate emergency to the Labour Party Conference. The panel included Sandy Martin MP, who said, 'Commercial forestry, done properly, is the best way of doing that. We need to look at the regulatory regime and the attitude of government'. Mr Martin added that there was 'enormous scope' for using far more timber for building in England. Read the full story on the Confor website.

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Future farming regulation

Defra recently held an event on the Farm Inspection and Regulation Review. Depending on political changes, there may be a full consultation in future. The aim is to maintain the high quality of our natural environment and animal welfare following the end of cross compliance. There is an opportunity to integrate farming, forestry and industry, and achieve compliance through a partnership business and public between sector. Inspections should provide information exchange as well as monitoring compliance.

The Review recommends a new independent regulator for farming and land management. This would need to consider: scale of remit (farming and land management, plant health, animal health and welfare), effectiveness at a national and local level; scope of activities and industries; boundaries and coherence with other regulatory bodies; degree of independence from government.

Conservation organisations are concerned that the process could result in an erosion of environmental standards.

Landscape review

The government's review into National Parks and AONB's has been published.

It makes six proposals towards 'a new commitment to recovery which puts natural beauty at its core to make all these places special':

- 1. a new mission for national landscapes
- 2. regular natural capital assessment
- 3. strengthened management plans
- 4. Nature Recovery Networks
- 5. funding through ELMS (p.7)
- 6. a strengthened role in planning
