- The previous speakers will have given you an insight into amounts of timber lost etc.
- Most likely a large amount of uncertified timber, premature, poor access, wind breakage and unplanned....all potentially leading to poorer returns to the owner.
- Storms just hit the industry when we are busy already with new woodland creation and still a very buoyant timber market.
- We were all just trying to get back to some sort of "normality" after the various Covid-19 lock downs etc. and were now hit with another "catastrophe".



In Summary:

- We are busy already.
- We have stretched resources (planting material, machinery, labour etc.).
- Timber returns from storm damage may be potentially lower.
- But there can also be opportunities, after all as foresters we are positive people and think long term!
