What's in it for the timber sector – to encourage the use of timber?

- Provide financial support to develop innovative timber products through the Forestry Innovation Fund
- Work with key construction stakeholders, including the Green Construction Board, Construction Leadership Council, House Building Federation, and Federation of Master Builders to develop a policy roadmap on use of timber
- Drive an increase in the use of certain modern methods of construction, some forms of which can encourage use of sustainable materials such as timber;
- Work with Homes England and delivery partners to explore ways to increase timber use in the delivery of housing programmes
- Increase public demand for sustainably sourced timber through procurement policies
- Encourage research into barriers to uptake of timber, including looking at timber strength grades and the fire resistance of engineered timber structures

How does the sector act now?

- We warmly welcome the increased positive and supportive focus from Government on our sector.
- How can the sector respond to this opportunity?
- The reality is that we've had decades of non-productive planting and we continue to remove much more wood-producing forest than we plant and have done for years.
- The broadleaf woodland we have been creating will provide little supply of wood unless management objectives change and we tackle the twin threat of deer and squirrel.
- Industry will plant the vast majority of the productive forestry that will create the future timber supply.
- Industry will develop the low carbon solutions needed and plan the way to a circular economy.



How do we collectively act now?

- Now is the time to work together.
- We need to focus on the importance of a constructive relationship between the private and public sector - especially the Forestry Commission and Defra.
- It also needs to include BEIS and the Dept. for Levelling Up, Housing & Communities.
- BEIS is responsible for navigating the transition to a low-carbon economy, and forestry and timber can be a leader in that space – but we need BEIS to gear up to working with the industry.
- Our pledge: Confor is committed to act as the honest broker and will work with the Forestry Commission, Defra and others to genuinely make a change.
